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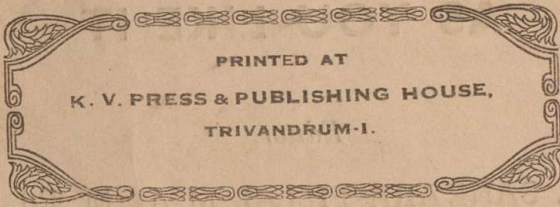

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## PREFACE

'As You Like It' is the third of a series of six stories from Shakespeare written in simple English for the use of Standard X pupils as home reading books. Only the words and sentence patterns used in the Detailed English Texts for Standards VI to IX have been introduced in this book. Whenever a new word is used its meaning is given at the foot of the page. Special care has been taken to see that the number of new words introduced is limited to two or three in a page of two hundred words.

'As You Like It' is one of the brightest of Shakespeare's comedies. It is the love story of Rosalind and Orlando and the background of the Forest of Arden makes it all the more beautiful. Rosalind is one of the most lovable heroines of Shakespeare. Her beauty, wit and charm make her very popular.

Self-administering tests have been given at the end of every chapter. Readers are requested to test themselves before they proceed to the next section.

A final test covering the whole book is given at the end. Teachers are requested to check up the library work of the pupils by giving the test orally or by making them write out the answers. Only new type tests have been given, most of them being multiple choice tests.

took him up in his arms and carried him to a shady place. Then he laid him down and said, "I will go and find some food for you. Rest here till I come back and do not talk of dying."



The news was received with great joy by the duke and his followers and everybody was pleased. Even the sad Jaques was glad. He

blessed the lovers but left them and went to live with Frederick. The good duke returned to the palace and lived happily.


