




In Salute



So the Carmelites rented a house near St Vincent's School as they had come for studies with the Jesuits. In 1946 the De Nobili premises were vacated and the community returned to Ramwadi and the Carmelites too moved there.

Carmel has not only been a house of formation, but has also taken pastoral care of the Syro-Malabar Catholics in and around Pune.



RELAXING WITH HIM AND 'HIMS'



As an old student of Carmel who enjoyed being there, I am only happy to jot these few lines in profound gratitude and deep appreciation for all that Carmel Vidya Bhavan stands for.

Intellectual pursuit coupled with spiritual growth and selfless service is a precious heritage the CMI Congregation has been privileged to receive from our three Founding Fathers - Acharya Thomas Palackal, Fr Thomas Porookara and Blessed Kuriakose Elias Chavara, the leading lights of the 19th century Kerala Church. A cursory reading of their life and work will bear ample witness to their thirst for knowledge and excellence in the variety of apostolic fields they entered into. Their conviction that only learned and intellectually well-equipped priests and pastors can give effective leadership for the renewal of the

The first batch of the students to go to Pune were Brothers Victorian Kunneparampil, Aggeus Koithara, Paulinus Jeerakathil (the late Bishop of Jagdalpur, MP) and Lucas Vithuvettickal on June 1. 1943. Rev Fr Eugene Manjooran was their Rector and Rev Fr Alfred Vadakekudy the local superior. These pioneers were staying in a rented building of Mr A D Coelho in the city. Br Jonas Thaliath (the late Bishop of Raikot) joined them the following year. These had their studies together with the Jesuit scholastics at De Nobili College. When it was closed down for some time on account of the Second World War the CMIs returned to Mangalore. In 1949 construction work started for the Sacred Heart Carmel House at the present site, a plot bought from De Nobili under the leadership of Fr Eugene Manjooran. Unfortunately Fr Eugene died quite unexpectedly in the thick

church prompted them to start seminaries at various places like Mannanam, Vazhakulam and Elthuruth. Later when a more systematic seminary training was introduced, the Congregation welcomed it and started sending many of its young students to the Jesuit Seminary at Mangalore. The close association with the Jesuits inspired the authorities to send a few students to the Papal Seminary then functioning at Kandy, Sri Lanka. The Congregation had even a plan to start a study house at Kandy. However, when it was known that the Papal Seminary would be shifted to Pune, efforts were directed to establish the proposed study house at Pune.

of the construction work. He was buried in the public cemetry in Pune. Later, on January 11, 1955 his mortal remains were transferred to Thevara and were reinterred in the monastery chapel.

With the construction of the new house, though very modest, a new batch of students arrived on May 15, 1951 after a break of almost five years. On December 10, 1951 Carmel was raised to the status of a canonical house. Papal Seminary was shifted to Pune in May 1955 and the Athenaeum started functioning from June of the same year.

Till the beginning of the eighties Carmel was a small community consisting mostly of two Rev Fathers and not more than ten students. The dawn of the eighties began to see early signs of a movement towards expansion. The terrace was converted to a common room and library and some additional rooms were made available. Some land adjacent to the Matchwel factory road was given to the CM

Fathers. Plans for a new parlour, dining hall and a well furnished library were approved and construction work started. In May 1990 Fr James Aerthayil took over the reigns of Carmel from Fr Andrews Athappilly. For a long time Rev Fathers from Carmel Vidya Bhavan used to cater

completed, was used as chapel on Sundays. The first floor was completed with a view to house a specialized library on the Syro-Malabar and oriental traditions. This, I am sure, is a significant contribution not only to the JDV Campus but also to the diocese of Kalyan and to oriental dioceses of North India as a whole.

The multi-purpose community hall which can equally serve as a chapel, is strong, spacious and beautiful. It is a blend of Indian, oriental and modern architecture and is probably the largest in the entire diocese. It owes its existence to the vivid imagination, dynamic spirit, farsightedness and relentless drive of Rev Fr James Aer-

for the pastoral and spiritual needs of the oriental catholics living in the city and its suburbs. In the late seventies, Rev Fr Gabinus Petta Cmi, the then Rector of the House, took great pains to organize the Syro-Malabarians into very active communities. This was, indeed, a great boon to the diocese of Kalyan when it was established in the second half of the eighties. All these communities became very active units of the Pune Zone and the area of Wadagaonshery was made into a parish and was entrusted to the Carmel Vidya Bhavan.

When it was found that the little chapel of the house was too small for the parish community, steps were taken to speed up the construction of the ground floor of the new extension, which, when

thayil and the generous and wholehearted cooperation of the parishioners and the strong support, continuous encouragement and paternal solicitude of Rt Rev Paul Chittilappilly, the Bishop of Kalyan. The land for the parish church is donated by the CMI congregation while a major share of the construction cost is met by the generous contribution of benefactors. The Carmel Hall thus stands as a sign and symbol of human fraternity, boundless generosity and christian solidarity.

Carmel is ever ready striding out for the distant hills. Time ahead holds new possibilities and potent challenges. Carmel, I am sure, will respond creatively to reap a good crop.



It was in 1960 that I came into contact with the Carmelites in Pune, though they were here on the Campus from 1943. This does not of course mean that before 1960 Carmelites had been strangers to me. In fact I have known them practically all my life. When I was growing up in Teekoy, the CMI Fathers from their Monastery in Poonjar used to come to our parish to preach and to hear confessions. Later I studied at Sacred Heart College, Thevara, run by the Carmelites. I have very pleasant memories of the two years I spent there. Strange as it may sound, one of the CMI Fathers, Fr Dismas, our hostel warden at Thevara, was instrumental in my joining the Society of Jesus in 1950. Thus my early association with the Carmelites was for me a source of joy and gratitude.

The Carmelites of Pune have impressed me in a variety of ways.

They have been outstanding in their spirit of hospitality. In this they have been typical Indians. Their warm, welcoming attitude makes it easy for any one to visit them. They also have made the Syro-Malabar Church present on the Campus. By and large this was done in a peaceful unobtrusive way. All the same they have made us keenly aware of the diversity in the Church - diversity of rites, liturgies, ecclesial traditions. I still remember that way back in 1962-63 when I was preparing for my ordination, the Rector of Carmel House, Fr Angel CMI, taught me Syriac. In fact, I celebrated my First Mass according to the Syro-Malabar rite. In the early 60's the Kerala Province of the Society of Jesus had opted for tri-ritualism.

Over the years, the CMIs have sent a number of outstanding students to JDV. This has been a source of mutual enrichment. JDV can justly be proud of the fact that several of the students have occupied and still are occupying significant positions in the Congregation. A few of them have been Prior Generals.

All this makes it clear that the presence of the CMIs on the JDV Campus has been a real blessing. It has benefited all of us. While gratefully remembering the 50 years of their life here, I wish them many more years of pleasant and fruitful stay in our midst.

When I came to Pune 41 years ago, only a quarter of the present De Nobili College building was completed in which Theology classes were offered to some Jesuit Scholastics and a few Carmelite Brothers.

On the occasion of the jubilee of Carmel, I remember with special appreciation and joy my first Carmelite students: Mathias, Charles, Werner and Roger. Since the number of the students was small, there was much more personal contact between students and professors than is possible now. And the response from the part of the CMI students was especially encouraging. They came more frequently to the professors' room discussing matters seen in class. Not surprisingly they were also always in the exams among those who scored the highest marks.

Their simplicity of life, openness, friendliness and co-operation remains as a vivid memory in my mind. One instance of give and take: Mathias once explained to me the symbolism of the Mar Thoma Cross which was new to me.

I wish all the members of the Carmel community God's abundant blessings on the occasion of their Golden Jubilee.

Though small in number, the students of Carmel have, over the years, been known not only for their intellectual and accademic standing on this campus, but also as men of a certain standard. In fact Carmel has been the nursery of some illustrious persons in the CMI family. To mention only a few: Fr Mathias Mundadan - a provincial and also well-known professor of Church history in Dharmaram College, and Fr Albert Nambiaparampil - the initiator and founder of the CMI centre in Rome, a priest devoted to the important apostolate of dialogue with non-Christians.

In other respects too, Carmel Vidya Bhavan has grown and developed a lot. On the happy occasion of its Golden Jubilee, I pray that with God's grace, this community may grow yet more and prepare many zealous and efficient priests and apostles for His work both in Kerala as well as in the virgin fields of the North.


As one who had the priestly and religious formation and training, in the Athenaeum campus, Pune, I vocalize my view on the relevance of our Carmel Vidya Bhavan in the campus even today.

With due safe-guard of our CMI community life which helps students to cherish our CMI heritage, the Carmel Vidya Bhavan has the following advantages:-

- 1. It helps to get a wider vision of life. Being one among the many study houses in the campus, students get ample opportunities to learn others and from others, evaluate and appreciate various trends and ways of life.
- 2. Here, there can be a more open training of students of our community. Instead of restricted modes of approaches one can if purposefully aims at it, imbibe and enrich oneself in different ways from others, both religious and diocesan forms of life.
 - 3. The above two benefits can be appropriated only by those who have more personal intent on their own spiritual and intellectual well-being that is to say, the students sent to, or chosen to be sent there, should have this specific calibre of self-education more than others. No collective training or formation may be valid here. A certain degree of independence is the pre-supposition and the wisdom in the students to avail them properly.
 - 4. Above all, the role of Carmel Vidya Bhavan in the Pune campus is to be beacon light for the Oriental Syro-Malabar reality, even after the creation of the Kalyan diocese which includes also Pune territorially. In the nineteen fifties we were an insignificant minority but guided the destinies of several Oriental Bishops and priests, inculcating in them due respect for their individual Church.

I wish success to the mission of Carmel Vidya Bhavan and wish a happy Golden Jubilee year.

INVOLVING TO EVOLVE



To evolve a fruitful interaction between theological reflection and involvement is the call of the context. This is the pastoral wisdom of the Church, too. Carmel has risen to the occasion. The parish in its name testifies just that.

The dawn of Good Friday in the year 1984 marked a turning point in the life of the Syrian Diaspora settled in and around Vadagaonshery. The dawn also saw a donning of a new mantle by Carmel Bhavan. A group of around 800 Syro-Malabar Catholics gathered together to comemmorate the death of our saviour Jesus Christ. The man who led the procession was Fr Gabinus Petta Cmi, the then Rector of Carmel Vidya Bhavan. Thereafter it was a symbiotic relationship. Drawing inspiration from the heritage of their congregation, the fathers and brothers of

Carmel delved into the field. The gesture paid rich dividents. The initial apathy of the people faded,

dynamic leadership emerged from among the laity and the bond of faith and love deepened.

With the coming into being of the Kalyan diocese, the Syro–Malabar community at Vadagaonshery received the official status of parish on 25 August 1988. Carmel's pioneering work was duly recognised and the task of management of the parish was laid on its shoulders. Fr Andrews Athappilly Cmi, Rector, Carmel Vidya Bhavan (1987–90), was appointed the vicar of the parish and Fr Thomas Cheeran his assistant.

It needs to be remembered with gratitude that the members of

Carmel Bhavan have put in invaluable services and sacrifices in nurturing the Parish to its present form. During Fr Andrew's tenure the CMI Congregation was kind enough to donate a piece of prime land to the parish. A seed amount of Rs. One lakh was raised by Fr Andrews with the co-operation and support from all parishioners and well wishers. However, this was not enough.

Then came in Fr James Aerthayil Cmi and things started moving faster. Today everyone acknowledges that our church is our power house of spiritual and moral energy.

> We have almost every thing today by the grace of the Almighty and with the support

of the CMI Congregation. We only wish that this relationship established through years of bond between the parish community and the members of Carmel Bhavan ever remain the same. Here it is assuring to note that the affection of a parent for his child never loses its warmth even after the child has grown into an adult.

The parish community, I am sure, will ever remain grateful to Carmel Bhavan for its invaluable services and now joins me in paying tribute to it on this auspicious occasion of its Golden Jubilee.
