Dharmaram Vidya Kshetram (DVK) is a Pontifical Athenaeum for higher learning and formation, established by the Congregation for Catholic Education, Vatican. It is empowered to grant degrees, including Licentiate and Doctorate in Philosophy and Theology, Licentiate in Oriental Canon Law and Master's in Formative Spirituality and Counselling.

Entrusted to the care of the Carmelites of Mary Immaculate (CMI), the first Indian indigenous religious congregation, DVK draws its inspiration from the charism of the founding fathers, Porukkara Thomas, Palackal Thomas and Blessed Chavara Kuriakose Elias who were Malpans of the time. Following the founding of the congregation in 1831, a seminary was started at Mannanam in 1833 which continued to exist and serve the Church till 1894. Later, it was set up at Chethipuzha in 1918. Listening to the universal call of the Church and understanding the needs of the time, Very Rev. Fr. Maurus Valiyaparampil CMI, the then Prior General and Rev. Fr. Jonas Thaliath CMI, who later became the first bishop of Rajkot, took leadership to transplant the Sacred Heart Seminary at Chethipuzha to Bangalore in 1957. It was the patronage and personal care of Eugene Cardinal Tisserant, the then Prefect of the Congregation for Oriental Churches, that contributed the most for this providential transfer. It was a response from the part of the CMI congregation to the divine benediction of institutional growth and to the equally divine call to assume wider apostolic responsibilities.

Today with its Faculties of Philosophy and Theology, Institutes of Oriental Canon Law, Formative Spirituality and Counselling, Extension Centres of Darsana Institute of Philosophy and Samanvaya Theological College, Affiliated Institutes, Research Programmes and Centres in India and abroad, DVK has emerged as an international centre of academic excellence contributing to the contemporary Indian Christian reflections. DVK works in close collaboration with the sister institution, Christ University, Bangalore, providing eligible students the possibility of having UGC recognized degrees such as BA in Philosophy, MA in Philosophy, MA in Theology and MA in Formative Spirituality and Counselling.



Doctoral Programme

IN PHILOSOPHY (Ph.D.) & IN THEOLOGY (Th.D.)

Eligibility: For admission to the Doctoral Programme the applicant must hold a Licentiate Degree or its equivalent in the field of his/her doctoral research with at least a high first class.

Duration: The minimum duration of the Doctoral programme is two years (four semesters), which may be extended up to five years. Residence in Bangalore is a requirement during the first year of the Doctoral programme.

Director and Second Guide: The candidate chooses the director from among the teachers of the Faculty. There shall be a second guide in case of research in interdisciplinary areas or when the director is from another Institute, and he shall be appointed by the Dean.

Doctoral Programme during the first two semesters shall be the following:

- a) Two tutorials/research papers.
- Two faculty seminars in which the members of the faculty and the students of the Licentiate programme are present.
- Some teaching assignments under the guidance of the director of the candidate.
- d) The candidate shall meet his/her director once in two months for discussions on the research.
- e) The candidate shall have the grade of first class for the tutorials and the research papers so that he/she may be promoted to the second year of the doctorate.
- f) The director of the candidate shall prepare a semestral report on the performance of the candidate and send it to the Dean of the Faculty.







Research Proposal: After having completed all other requirements the candidate shall present a Research Proposal to a panel of three examiners, including the director. The Research Proposal includes a statement of the question or issue of research and its significance, methodology and procedure of the research, provisional titles of the chapters and their contents, projected conclusions, and the bibliography both primary and secondary.

Dissertation Approval: The maximum number of words for the dissertation shall be 1,20,000. Before the public defence, three readers are appointed by the Dean to scrutinize the draft, and at least two of them must approve it before promoting the candidate to the public defence.


Public Defence: A panel of four examiners, including the director, the second guide, if any, and at least one of the three readers are appointed by the Dean of the Faculty to examine the public defence of the thesis.

M.Phil. Programme: It is a one-year predoctoral programme in Philosophy. During this period the candidate shall be required to complete twelve courses (12x2=24 credits) in various branches and traditions in Philosophy. Regular lectures, tutorials or seminars may be conducted for this purpose or such candidates may be allowed to attend the regular L.Ph. course conducted in the year of registration for M.Phil. Programme. The faculty may prescribe additional course work of a longer duration for students whose philosophical background is deficient.

Programme

The two-year Licentiate in Philosophy is a P.G. programme with research orientation that gives the students opportunities to specialize in a particular area of philosophy. At the same time, it aims at providing a comprehensive and contemporary synthesis of various philosophical disciplines. It offers ample opportunities for private study and personal work under the guidance of competent teachers and also personal training for self-expression. The Licentiate Degree in Philosophy, that is granted at the end of the successful completion of this programme, qualifies the student for admission to a Doctorate in Philosophy in all Ecclesiastical Faculties in Philosophy all over the world.

Requirements for Admission

L.Ph. programme is open to candidates having secured a high second class in the B.Ph. of this faculty. Agraduate of second class standing in any subject who has passed the diploma course in philosophy of this faculty is also eligible to apply. B.Th. Degree holders from any theological faculty in India or abroad, which presupposes regular philosophical training according to the seminary system, are also considered eligible, provided they pass the entrance test. Those who have successfully completed the regular philosophy programme of a Catholic Seminary may be admitted to L.Ph. provisionally, subject to their passing a comprehensive viva-voce or written test as prescribed by the Dean. Those who have completed a two-year training in philosophy have to do one year prelicentiate in philosophy.



Diploma in Philosophy

Faculty of Philosophy offers Diploma in Philosophy of one year and two years duration. Usually, the one year programme is offered to the non-clerical students, who have already secured a Bachelor's Degree in any subject from a recognized university. The two year

Diploma in Philosophy is offered in view of equipping clerical candidates to pursue their theological studies at any ecclesiastical institute or university. While the two year programme offers an in-depth introduction to the history of philosophy, one year programme will concentrate more on systematic philosophy.

Bachelor of Philosophy

Faculty of Philosophy offers a three year long Bachelor of Philosophy. Along with philosophy, this course also introduces the students to both Psychology and

English Literature, apart from the regular classes in languages such as Sanskrit, Latin, etc. There is an added advantage to those students who want to pursue a secular Bachelor's Degree, as this programme is simultaneously recognized by the Christ University. A successful completion of this three year degree programme, then enables a candidate to secure both an ecclesiastical Bachelor of Philosophy (from DVK) and a UGC recognized BA Honours in Philosophy from Christ University.





Licentiate in Oriental Canon Law



Objectives

- To train personnel for the eparchial curias and ecclesiastical tribunals of the dioceses in India and in other Asian countries
- To train teachers in Oriental and Latin Canon Law (cf.,CCEOcc. 340 §1,471 §2; CICc. 253 §1)
- To prepare competent personnel of Religious Institutes who can help in the formulation and updating of their Constitutions and in their work of religious formation as well as administration
- To promote collaboration and co-ordination among the various ecclesiastical tribunals existing in India.
- To enable students to understand the meaning and implications of canon law in the context of civil law of India and to promote a healthy dialogue between these two legal systems

Programme



- The Licentiate in Oriental Canon Law (LOCL) enables the candidates to be admitted to doctorate in Canon Law; it also entitles one to teach in a major seminary and to take up various ecclesiastical offices which require such a title according to canon law.
- 2. It is a three year (six semesters) programme which aims at specialization in the Codes of Canon Law. A profound study of the Codex Canonum Ecclesiarum Orientalium is offered in relation to the Codex Iuris Canonici and with reference to Pastor Bonus, thereby covering the entire Corpus Iuris Canonici that is now in force. Besides, the particular laws of various Oriental Churches will be dealt with. This programme pays rigorous attention to scientific methods and consists of lectures, seminars and a scientifically prepared thesis. With a view to future ministry, students are given practical training in jurisprudence in ecclesiastical tribunals.
- 3. Lectures on different titles of the Code are offered as principal courses. Related disciplines, such as philosophy and theology of law, history of canon law, canonical institutes, public ecclesiastical law, elements of civil law, are auxiliary courses. Besides, a number of optional courses are also offered, from which students have to select courses according to the area of their specialization.
- 4. The Institute is attentive to the inculturation of the Law of the Church. For this purpose the Constitution of India as well as the ancient legal systems of the Land are studied under the guidance of specialists, in collaboration with various law schools in Bangalore. Different branches of Indian civil law also receive due attention.

Eligibility

The students having B.Th. degree or its equivalent are eligible. The applicants, if they are clerics or Religious, must be presented by their Hierarch or Major superior as the case may be. In the case of lay candidates, they shall be recommended by a competent person acceptable to the Institute
